QUESTIONED BY A VISITING client about the price of the 1930's glass vases arranged on shelving behind his desk, Bruce Bierman responded that they weren't for sale. "Then

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she asked me, 'But why are they here?'"

recalls **Bruce Bierman Design's** affable principal, who was forced to remind the client: "Because it's *my* office!"





All 2,500 square feet of it, spanning the length of a building in the Flatiron District. At the front are Bierman's office and the conference room. Divided by a full-height folding screen, the two can be joined for large presentations. "You also get the maximum sense of space," he says, "which is something I always encourage my clients to do, too."

From the principal's office and conference room, sight lines extend straight to the rear studio. Bierman's architectural training—first revealed by the folding screen—again becomes clear, this time with the regularly spaced beams dramatically articulated by floodlights.

Wool carpet tempers

the studio's whiteness. Elsewhere, flooring of Brazilian cherry wood maintains the marked unfussiness of the overall sensibility. With Bierman, though, "neutral" should never, ever be confused with boring. —Aric Chen
