WHEN A 25-FOOT-HIGH, two-storied room includes an inviting place to curl up and read a book, it's a sure sign that the interior designer has achieved something significant. In this case, a Greenwich, Conn. couple turned to Bruce Bierman, a designer known for his purist modern esthetic, to make their 18,000 square foot Florida house a home. Built by J.F. Brennan in the exclusive Bear's Club, a private golf community in Jupiter, the rambling house includes Palladian architectural references, terra cotta roof tile from South America and grand French-inspired interiors.

That's precisely what the homeowners wanted for their second home. Built on a double lot, the house is an expansive 200 feet from end to end and designed on a central axis so that rooms flow into each other with ease.

The couple, with two young children, prefers large spaces and gracious proportions. Despite the house's grandeur, it is the setting for family life: children running throughout, guests visiting for long weekends, barbecues by the pool and a very private oasis to unwind. For example, says the wife, the comfort and elegance of the living room makes it her favorite room in the house. "I love my living room. The color, the space, the drapes are simple but dramatic.

I can read a book in there or entertain a group of friends," she says.

Staying true to his modern design sensibility, Bierman adapted the sprinciples he would use in designing a spare white box. The result is a with a tranquil ambience and distinctive, intimate interiors that could wise have felt daunting.

"This," Bierman explains, "is my take on traditional." Utilizing a to on-tone color palette with accents of pattern and luxurious materials add subtle touches of color in the rooms, the designer imbued a tradithouse with lightness in every sense. Even the accessories do not overwhelm the space. "I intentionally didn't fill up the spaciousness that upart of the architecture," he adds.

Using a consistent palette is part of his trick. Here, creamy white is a restrained backdrop for Aubusson carpets, mirrored furniture and over scaled upholstery, all inspired by the elegance of Palm Beach in the 194

chairs are dressed in materials such as silk, velvet and cashmere, all in white, adding a tactile luxuriousness to the room. The walls have raised decorative plaster paneling chosen because Bierman wanted details in the house that felt substantial.

Bierman found an antique Venetian mirror at the Lorin Marsh showroom in New York. Its shape was perfect to hang over the fireplace, but it was only four feet high. So, he deftly reworked its proportions to fit that space. The replicated version is 10 feet high and was fabricated in Italy. A delicate line of blue glass trim embellishes the mirror with a subtle yet couture-like detail.

In the family room, a palm leaf pattern

depicted on the carpet suggested the pale green hue for both chair and sofa fabrics. While the wall color, once again, is creamy white, curtains in gauzy apple green filter sunlight and add a dash of color.

Another important aspect of Bierman's design focuses on scale: all of the custom furniture is sized in the correct proportion for each room. Due to the volume of the house, a sofa less than nine feet in length would simply not look right, he explains. In large houses a common mistake is using furniture that's too small. Taking cues from other masters of design, Bierman had much of the furniture custom made for these rooms. "When you look at some of the great homes, from

Fallingwater to Versailles, specific furniture was made for specific rooms," he adds.

"We wanted rooms that had depth," Bierman says. "The whole house is about detail but in a very edited way."

The master suite is a private chamber consisting of bedroom, bathroom, two dressing rooms and study. It embodies conflored and relaxation with overcaled upholstered pieces covered in sumptious chenilles and satins. Even the bathroom has a chaise covered in supple leather. The dazzling furnishings, an antique subser-leaf bed and mirrored furniture, are meticulous reproductions. Staying true to the fine detail and craftsmanship of the originals was important to Bierman and helped create a feeling of authenticity.
